Future Training Opportunities 2013

Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (S11) - Friday, April 19-Saturday, April 20 - \$15.00

This outdoor skills training is being offered by the Sierra District on Friday, April 19th through Saturday, April 20th. Cost will be \$15.00. In order for all Scoutmasters, Assistant Scoutmasters, , 11 Year old Scoutmasters (LDS), Varsity Team Coaches, Varsity Team Assistant Coaches, Venturing Crew Advisors (w/ outdoor program), and Associate Venturing Crew Advisors to be considered fully trained, they must complete this camping portion of basic training. When available, registration materials will be found on the Sierra District's website (www.scouter.org/districts/sierra).

Wood Badge (A90, 6 credits) - July 29-August 3 - Camp Lee, Elko Area

Wood Badge for the 21st Century is a Scouting leadership program designed for all adult Scouters. Wood Badge courses aim to make Scouters better leaders by teaching advanced leadership skills, and by creating a bond and commitment to the Scout movement. Courses generally have a combined classroom and practical outdoors-based phase followed by a Wood Badge ticket, also known as the project phase. By "working the ticket," participants put their newly gained experience into practice to attain ticket goals aiding the Scouting movement. The Nevada Area Council's Wood Badge course will be held at Camp Lee with Kathi Colbert as the course director.

National Youth Leadership Training (S78) - August 5-10 - Camp Lee, Elko Area

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) is a youth leadership development training offered by the Boy Scouts of America. The program is conducted at the council level and is intended to provide in-depth training covering a number of leadership ideas and skills for Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venturers. It is open to both boys and girls. NYLT is run by youth leaders under adult supervision. This summer, the Nevada Area Council's NYLT course will be held at Camp Lee with Creon Sant as the course director. All youth age 13-20 are invited to attend. Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouts must have earned the rank of First Class.

Back to Basics Training - October 18-19 - Reno Area

Back to Basics is a council training event developed to offer basic training in the fall for leaders at all levels: Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Varsity Scouting, Venturing, and Commissioner Service. This event will also include BALOO (Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation), Outdoor Leader Skills for Webelos Leaders, and Merit Badge Counselor Training.


Cub Scout Leader Pow Wow - November 16 - Reno Area

Course fee includes Den Chief Handbook.


The Den Chief is an older Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, or Venturer who works with a Cub Scout or Webelos den. He is selected by the Scoutmaster, Coach, or Advisor in cooperation with the Cubmaster. He may be of any age or rank, but he can be the greatest help if he is a former Cub Scout and if he is mature enough to assume this important responsibility. As a selected leader of younger boys, the Den Chief has the opportunity to help them complete their Cub Scout or Webelos Scout advancement requirements and to live up to Cub Scouting's ideals in their everyday lives. The Den Chief is a member of a leadership team which also includes the Den Leader, Assistant Den Leader, and the Denner. The Den Chief is already what every Cub Scout and Webelos Scout would like to be - a Boy Scout. As far as the younger boys are concerned, he or she is the person they would most like to follow, and that makes the Den Chief a natural leader for them.

This one day training experience is intended for those Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, or Venturers who would like to serve in a leadership position while giving service to brother Cub Scouts. Elements of this training include:
